## Roxanne Hamako Nomura



Roxanne Nomura (Shinoda) was born in Torrance, California and was the youngest of six children. She moved to Santa Barbara in the mid 1960's.

Roxanne graduated from San Marcos High School, where she was President of the Usherettes, and competed on the Girls Swim Team. She then went to Santa Barbara City College and graduated with an Associate of Arts degree in Medical Assisting.

In 1973, she married her High School sweetheart, Wade Nomura, and in 1976 moved to Carpinteria. They have two children; Lisa and Ryan, and two grandchildren, Zach and Tyler.

Roxanne's professional career in Real Estate started in 1986, and was awarded the Santa Barbara Association's "Rookie of the Year" for being the top new sales person, and remained in the top ten percent each year. In 2008, Roxanne received the "Distinguished Service Award" for her volunteer service to the community, which is the highest award presented to a Realtor by the Santa Barbara Association of Realtors. She also served as the Santa Barbara Fair Housing Chair and a member of the Education Committee.

Roxanne's involvement with the community included serving on the Santa Barbara Junior Golf Tour Board of Directors, the Santa Barbara Athletic Roundtable Board of Directors and inductee to their Hall of Fame in 2008 for her Volunteerism in the Community, Past President of the Carpinteria American Heart Association Chapter, member of the Santa Barbara Heart Association Board of Directors, Santa Barbara Japanese American Citizens League Board of Directors, UCSB's Intercollegiate Athletic Policy Board of Directors, and an active member and Past President of the Rotary Club of Carpinteria Morning. Roxanne was the first female president of the Carpinteria Morning Rotary Club in 2005-2006, and received Major Donor recognition by the Rotary Foundation.

Roxanne also served as the General Coordinator with her husband Wade, for the Tomol Interpretive Play Area, and was named the 2011 "Carpinterians of the Year" with Wade.

Roxanne travelled around the world with Wade on behalf of Rotary, doing projects and meetings in Mexico, Belize, Guatemala, Honduras, Chile, Korea, Japan, Thailand, India, Australia, New Zealand, Portugal, England, Denmark, Canada, and many U.S. states.

Roxanne had a passion for service and loved making people happy through her unselfish efforts in benefitting others, and was famous for her baking and cookies.

## SATISFACTION + LIFE LESSONS: RC DOWNTOWN SANTA BARBARA'S ON-GOING GUATEMALAN SERVICE PROJECT

Sixteen people from the Rotary Club of Downtown Santa Barbara, Rotaract, and Unity Church recently returned from nine days of service in Guatemala. The group partnered with Mayan Families, a non-profit dedicated to educate, feed, shelter, and heal indigenous Guatemalans. In Guatemala, nearly 80% of the indigenous population lives on less than \$2 a day and 50% of children are chronically malnourished. Additionally, over 3 million Guatemalans lack access to safe drinking water.

The groups were able to raise over \$17,000 to assist families in towns around Lake Atitlan. Throughout the week they built homes, installed stoves, assembled water filters, worked in preschools, and distributed items of need to local families.

Several members of the group also sponsor nine children year round. The sponsorship allows the children to attend school, seek medical care, and have a reliable supply of food. Sponsors were able to connect with their students, meet their families, and deliver items they desperately need.

"The best part of sponsoring Marta is being able to make a difference in her life," said Terri Eddy who has participated in this trip for the last two years. Eddy and her husband Don Jack sponsor a young girl that lost both of her parents when she was eleven. Without the help of sponsorship she faced a bleak future and would likely have to work in the fields to survive rather than go to school. "Marta brings us great joy in being able to help such a caring, intelligent, and deserving child. When we help others we improve our own happiness and mental wellness."

This year the group worked together to pour concrete floors in homes for two sponsored students that previously lived with dirt floors. Steve Petersen sponsors Sonia and her family and looks forward to this trip every year. "Even though we don't speak the same language verbally we do speak the same language with our hearts," he said as the two beamed and shared a big hug.

For many in the group, the trip was a refreshing reminder of what's important in life. "Not only do we do great work down here on behalf of Rotary, Unity Church, and Mayan Families, but we also get to see what another culture is like," said Bill Dutton, director of international projects with Santa Barbara Rotary. "And while the Mayan people do need a lot of support, they also show us that life

does not have to have all the complexities like we have in the United States. We can live in many different ways and don't have to have a lot of money to feel content."

This was the fourth year the Rotary Club of Downtown Santa Barbara has participated in this project. The Unity Church has been involved for the last two years. Both groups are scheduled to return next year and will be seeking donations to continue to implement this important work.

## GIVE ME SHELTER: NOW GLOBAL GRANTS CAN HELP

Clubs and districts can now use global grants to build low-cost shelters and simple schools, under a recent policy change that will be in effect through 2019. The construction must be part of a comprehensive project related to an area of focus. (Projects that involve construction alone are still not eligible for global grants.)

Please note that these structures are limited. Low-cost shelters are intended to provide housing for the destitute or homeless. Simple schools provide very modest schools in areas that previously had none; they aren't intended to enhance existing schools. ## GLOBAL GRANT FUNDS SIGHT RESTORING SURGERIES IN GUANAJUATO, MEXICO

The Rotary Club of Santa Barbara Sunrise partnered with the Rotary Club of Celaya Nat-Tha-Hi on a Rotary Global Grant for the purchase of a new ophthalmic microscope and lens kits for cataract surgeries, and then a four-day surgical clinic was held at Clinica Beatriz Velazco de Aleman in Celaya, Guanajuato, Mexico. Surgical Eye Expeditions (SEE) International, a non-profit humanitarian organization that provides medical, surgical and educational services, provided volunteer ophthalmic surgeons for the clinic. Ensuring the sustainability of the project, the ophthalmic microscope will be used to train surgeons and medical staff in order to treat more patients each year. The cataract operating program is expected to treat between 500 and 2,000 individuals this year.

If cataracts are not treated in a timely manner they ultimately may become inoperable. Untreated cataracts create grave social and economic distress within the family unit. The affected person loses his capacity to participate productively with his family. Individuals receiving timely treatment for cataracts increase their annual productivity exponentially. Patients treated within this program represent the most financially challenged population in this region. The surgeries are provided at no cost to the patients. One patient shared her sense of pride because she can now babysit her grandchildren which will allow the parent to return to the workforce.

Volunteer Rotarians performed various activities such as transportation, check-in patients, visit with families of patients, assist nursing staff with supplies and pre-operative preparations, and assist surgical staff with patients. Additionally, volunteers joined with medical staff and patients for post-surgery follow-up examination.

Funding for this project was provided by a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation, Rotary Club of Celaya Nat-Tha-Hi, Rotary Club of Santa Barbara Sunrise Charitable Foundation, and Rotary International Districts 4140 and 5240.

The Rotary Club of Santa Barbara Sunrise has a long and successful relationship with the Rotary Club of Celaya Nat-Tha-Hi and SEE International collaborating on cataract surgery missions for over 20 years.

**TRF Giving Rotarians:** The number of existing active Rotarians who have contributed \$25 or more to any fund of The Rotary Foundation. Please note, reports prior to 2016-17 will include any contribution (below \$25).

**Percent TRF Giving:** The number of Existing Active Rotarians who have contributed \$25 or more to any fund of The Rotary Foundation divided by the number of Existing Active Rotarians.

**TRF Giving Banner:** 'Y' = Those clubs who had 100 percent participation in TRF Giving and achieved US\$100 or more in average TRF giving.

**EREY Rotarians:** The number of existing active Rotarians who have contributed \$25 or more to the Annual Fund. Please note, reports prior to 2016-17 will include any contribution (below \$25).

**Percent EREY:** The number of Existing Active Rotarians who have contributed \$25 or more to the Annual Fund divided by the number of Existing Active Rotarians.

**EREY Banner:** 'Y' = Those clubs who had 100 percent participation in EREY and achieved US\$100 or more in Annual Fund Per Capita giving.

**Sustaining Member Rotarians:** The number of existing active Rotarians who have contributed \$100 or more to the Annual Fund.

**Percent Sustaining Members:** The number of Existing Active Rotarians who have contributed \$100 or more to the Annual Fund divided by the number of Existing Active Rotarians.

**100% SM Banner:** 'Y' = Those clubs who had 100 percent of their members contribute US\$100 or higher to the Annual Fund.

During the year, most clubs experience changes in club membership, including new members, changes in members' contact information, and membership terminations. To ensure accuracy of this report, communicate all changes to RI as soon as they become effective, using MyRotary, the Membership Data Form, or your club or district database if they are integrated with RI. The Rotary Foundation cannot update membership information. Be sure to notify your district governor and update club records.

#### Headlines:

- The World Health Assembly (WHA) is meeting next week in Geneva, Switzerland. Ministers of Health and public health professionals from around the world will convene to discuss global public health issues, including the global drive to eradicate polio. Delegates are anticipated to review current status against each of the four objectives of the **Polio Endgame Plan**, including reviewing a report requested by the Executive Board (EB) in January 2017 on issues related to transition planning. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) secretariat has prepared a **status report**, which will inform the discussions by Member States.

#### Afghanistan:

- No new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week.** The total number of cases for 2017 remains three, and for 2016 remains 13. The most recent case had onset of paralysis on 21 February, from Kunduz province.

#### Pakistan:

- No new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week.** The total number of WPV1 cases for 2017 remains two, and for 2016 remains 20. The most recent case had onset of paralysis on 13 February, from Diamir district, Gilgit Baltistan.

#### Lake Chad Basin:

- The **detection of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) and circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2)** in Nigeria poses a risk to the neighbouring countries of the Lake Chad basin and hence an outbreak response plan is being implemented as part of the response to the Nigeria outbreak.
